WHAT DID THE EVENT DELIVER?

IWD breakfast

- Amanda Wilson (GSC Director of Corporate Services) was the MC
- Approx. 45 community members attended the breakfast. The community were invited through social media, and personalised emails
- Community members were provided with coffee, and a light breakfast
- 16 attendees responded to the post event survey

- 14 women attended the art session in Cohuna, facilitated by The Dandy Lion Studio. 11 attendees responded to the post event survey
- 10 women attended the session in Quambatook, facilitated by Caroline Ellis. 4 attendees responded to the post event feedback

FEEDBACK FOR IWD BREAKFAST

LEARNINGS FOR IWD BREAKFAST

- All attendees agreed the event length was about the right length of time
- We polled attendees to check what time they would like future events, breakfast is still the most popular time
- Attendees liked the venue inside, but a number of attendees felt the foyer was too small and made
 accessing the breakfast difficult. Also balancing breakfast and coffee on lap was difficult, tables and
 chairs would be better. One attendee mentioned the venue inside the library would work well, similar
 to the first IWD event
- One attendee mentioned it's a shame that more men didn't attend men should also celebrate/respect IWD

OPPORTUNITIES FOR IWD BREAKFAST

- Attendees suggested 'Whilst everyone spoke really well, I think a Q & A format might be easier on the guest speakers'
- Guest speaker suggestions: Journey of a country girl originally from Kerang who has established a very large fashion business in Melbourne while managing a young family first starting at home attending a local market 10 years ago now 25 staff warehouses, styling sessions -Alison Moore F&N. Also Carole Wandin amazing story
- Suggestion only Jacqui Hibbert as Australian Day Citizen of the Year 2024 and Mary Fenton would be very entertaining to listen to. Thanks for great event
- Love the focus on providing a safe platform for local women to share their stories. I would like this to continue as there are so many more inspirational women to hear from. Perhaps as a side project, a program could be run that builds public speaking confidence just for local women. To create a safe environment to build confidence for local women to share their stories in front of a small group would be very empowering I feel and would see flow-on benefits to the wider community. I also feel that this would help to support more women across the wider community to be confident to step outside their comfort zone and tell their story, and by doing so normalise and de-stigmatise a lot of challenges as women we probably all experience in life, but don't generally talk openly about. This positive profiling of local women is also really important for young girls across our community so that we can build a community of confident women into the future
